I am also involved in research and analysis in other projects related to labour standards, such as the Canadian Labour Code Data Analysis Infrastructure (analysis of federal labour standards data), the Contested "Core of Indianness" (data, law, and policy analysis of labour regulations and the Indian Act as they come into contact with First Nations people), and Liberating Migrant Labour (data analysis tracing conditions and outcomes of new "international mobility programs" and temporary worker programs, as well as traditional

temporary labour migration).

June 2019 - Research Assistant for Yoonjung Kang. — In collaboration with Yoonjung, I developed,

implemented and ran an experiment on the effect of speech rate on perception of the Japanese quantity distinction for consonants and vowels, including recording and manipulating stimuli using Praat and writing the experiment script in jsPsych. The resulting

paper is now under review.

them suitable for acoustic analysis. Preparation for alignment involved fixing typos and spelling inconsistencies in the original transcripts, then generating and editing pronun-

ciations for words not present in the built-in pronunciation dictionary.
